



News from Whitted Bowers Farm

Wow. With night time temperatures in the 50's for the last 10 days, the soil has exploded with all things spring, even though we are not officially there yet. The birds are serenading us in the morning and the peepers chime in at night providing the most lovely bookends on the day. Mason, honey and bumble bees are dancing around the blossoming plums, strawberries and blueberries. Soon the blackberry blossoms will pop and the symphony will evolve. Everything is a deeper green. The crops in the field are jumping as if in a contest to see who can be ready first. We've been picking asparagus for 5 days now, the surest sign that the season is here. This is an amazing time of year on the farm. Nature spirits abound and it is hard not to feel their presence. (continued on next page)

It has been an incredibly busy "off season" for us. We've added roads, over 220 fruit trees, more brambles and have been fully occupied with the usual array of down time duties. One of the things we are most excited about is the completion of our new pick-your-own



shelter/farm stand. Francisco Plaza's fine craftsmanship is now on display and the building will help our visitors find shade, relax and gaze out on the fields. perhaps

while others pick berries!

We've also continued our efforts to educate the general public about biodynamic agriculture. We hosted Dr. David Orr, Professor of Organics at NC State, Masters and Doctoral students in early March for a tour of the farm and discussion about biodynamic agriculture. We are a test sight for Dr. Orr's research involving native plantings for pollinators and beneficial insects. Related to Dr. Orr's work, we are also very excited to have been asked by the Xerces Society for Invertebrate Conservation, an Oregon-based non-profit dedicated to the preservation of native pollinators, to be a demonstration site for the east coast. We are in the midst of putting together a plan to expand our native plantings to ensure ample forage for all of our native pollinators and beneficial insects. Additionally, the farm was featured in the most recent addition of the Saturday Evening Post in a cover article titled, "The Organic Food Paradox" written by Barry Yeoman, a Durham-based freelance journalist. We will be on the Carolina Farm Stewardship Farm Tour April 28th and 29th. The tour is a wonderful opportunity to see and visit with farms who are creating one of the most vibrant local food scene's in the country. This will be our fifth year in a row on the tour. Lastly, we will participate in the annual Farm to Fork Picnic in late May. The picnic was described by Gourmet magazine as the "best buffet in the country." Local farms are teamed with area chefs in a wonderful celebration. We feel fortunate and blessed to continue to have venues to talk about biodynamics and the importance of local, sustainable food.

We recently received our formal Demeter Biodynamic certification for this season. This is the fourth year running for our certification and we are proud to be affiliated with Demeter-USA, an organization that is on the forefront of sustainable agriculture and the battle against corporate farming and all that comes with it. We remain one of two farms in the southeast with the Demeter certification.


And lastly, the strawberries will be very early this year. We anticipate opening the Pick-Your-Own **as early as April 10**. There are loads of green fruit on the plants and we appear to be headed for a great season. But, a lot can happen in a few weeks, so we remain conscious that all of this is a gift. We invite all of you to come visit the farm and to help support biodynamics in the southeast.

ARTIST ANNE STOCKTON HAS CROSSED THE THRESHOLD

On Tuesday, January 31, 2012, Anthroposophical artist Anne Stockton departed this life. Anne's Funeral Service was held on February 6th at the Christian Community Church in Forest Row, England. Although born in America, Anne spent much of her adult life in England.

Anne was one of the founding members of Emerson College in Forest Row and she taught painting there for many years. She and her late husband Kurt Falk helped to found the Tobias School of Art in 1979. Anne wrote a number of books during her life including two children's books which she illustrated: Honey Bun: An Enchanting Memoir About an Exceptional Cat and The Harvest Story. She also wrote Art: An Introductory Reader and most recently she created the veil paintings for The Illustrated Calendar of the Soul.



Anne was introduced to Anthroposophy by her Mother who discovered Anthroposophy while pregnant with Anne's brother, Peter. Peter was very good friends with Henry Barnes. They were in school from first grade until they began their college studies at Harvard University. Unfortunately, Peter died while at Harvard; however, it was Anne and Peter's Mother who introduced the Barnes brothers to Anthroposophy. Anne described her brother and the Barnes brothers (Henry and Edward) as being like "Parzival seeking the Grail".

The drawing on the left was shown to Rudolf Steiner by Count Lerchenfeld. The Count said to Steiner that this picture had been with his family for many years, and he believed it to be an ancestor of his. New Buying Club at Infinity Farm

I have been considering several variations to the familiar CSA (community supported agriculture) model for the farm this year. The reason being that the original CSA model that developed in New England in the mid-1980's has become less and less appealing to today's lifestyle. While a noble attempt to connect consumers with their farmers, it does not offer the flexibility and convenience we are used to in other food venues. This year, after much research and conversation, I am offering what could be called more of a buying club than a CSA. You may still consider it a CSA if you want since, by joining the club, you will definitely be part of the community supporting Infinity Farm. This model will be more user friendly for you and not add too much extra time and labor for me. Another new twist is that I am collaborating with Whitted Bowers Farm (a biodynamic fruit and vegetable farm just down the road). Their delicious strawberries and various melons will be available through Infinity Farm's buying club. Also, in the fall, the superb wild caught sockeye salmon that was obtained last year for CSA members and others will be part of the buying club as well. My goal is to eventually work with other biodynamic and organic producers in order to offer a "grocery store" of healthy (mainly biodynamic) produce for members. — **Jon Lyerly**

About the Farm

Infinity Farm is located on 161 beautiful acres in northern Orange County. It is an ideal mix of pastureland and forest with 4 ponds and a wildlife marsh area. The land has been farmed since 2003 using sound biodynamic and organic agricultural principles. We use absolutely no chemical fertilizers, pesticides, herbicides, or fungicides. All animals are hormone and antibiotic free.

In 2012 we are growing a wide range of vegetables, herbs and flowers for our buying club and wholesale accounts.

About the farmer

Jon Lyerly has been involved in biodynamic farming since 1998. He apprenticed for four seasons on several biodynamic farms. Since 2002 he has managed three farms and has given workshops and classes at independent institutions and biodynamic conferences. He has a B.S in Microbiology from Auburn University.

FAQ's

What is biodynamics?

Biodynamics is a method of farming that incorporates sound organic farming practices such as composting, cover cropping and crop rotations. In addition, specific preparations or remedies are applied to the compost piles and also sprayed directly on the fields, which have been shown to homeopathically enhance nutrient uptake, root formation and photosynthesis resulting in superior crops. What kind of produce is available?

A wide variety of vegetables, culinary herbs, flowers plus early season strawberries and wild caught sockeye salmon. Please see our harvest schedule.

• Where and when can I pick up my share?

Shares can be picked up at the farm at 1600 McDade Store Rd. Cedar Grove, NC. Also multiple pick up sites (most likely 6 or 7) in Chapel Hill, Carrboro, Durham and Hillsborough will be available. Specific locations and times/days will be given shortly.

When does the season begin?

This is totally dependent on the weather. Continued mild weather can push the first week of harvest as early as the third week of April. Notice of start date will be given in early April.

- How does the buying club work?
 - * Each week an availability list of crops and prices will be sent to members. From that list you may chose whichever crops and amounts of each for your box. Orders must be placed before 5:00pm of the evening before your pick up day.

- * There is a \$20.00 minimum on orders.
- * You may skip any number of weeks anytime you wish. Simply do not place an order for those weeks.
- * There are 3 ways you may join:
 - 1. Membership fee of \$50.00. This includes \$25.00 for materials and labor plus \$25.00 credit towards produce. You may pay as you order per week after your \$25.00 of credit is used up.
 - 2. Membership fee of \$200.00. This includes \$25.00 for materials and labor plus \$175.00 credit towards produce. You may pay as you order after your \$175.00 of credit is used up or pay an additional \$200.00 (all for produce) at that time.
 - 3. Membership fee of \$400.00. This includes \$25.00 for materials and labor plus \$375.00 credit towards produce. If your credit is used up before the season is over you may pay as you order per week until season's end.

- * On Infinity Farm's website (in progress) there will be a Paypal option for convenient weekly payments.
- * 5 wax boxes (2 for the rotation plus 3 spares) will be provided for each member (part of your \$25.00 fee). These are your boxes with your name on them. Please return the previous week's box.
- * For those of you with credit, a record of the week's purchase with remaining credit will be provided in your box each week.



Annual General Meeting Rudolf Steiner Branch of the Anthroposophical Society of America March 17, 2012

This year's meeting was a warm and lively gathering of 18 people. It was held in the Eurythmy Room of the Emerson Waldorf School.

Introductions and agenda presided over by President Peg Carmody.

After a reading of the *Calendar of the Soul*, Peg read the names of those who have crossed the Threshold in the past year.

All were then asked to give a short review of a significant event related to the Branch which occurred over the past year. This proved to be an important revelation and recollection of the variety of events which took place within the Branch and the nature of its individuals and their personal situations.

We were then presented with a preview of what is or will be happening over 2012.

The Foundation Studies program will graduate their next set of graduates in June. Douglas Gerwin will be visiting soon. There are 17 students at present.

- Much discussion over possible speaker/workshop venues to be decided relatively soon. There is a desire to hear from the community for ideas for Michaelmas and Whitsun of this year.
- Mention was made of the 100th anniversary of eurythmy this year and hopes that something special could be offered.
- A movie night has been proposed with the recently released film on the life of Rudolf Steiner
- Another movie was also mentioned. "The Queen of the Sun" could be shown in conjunction with a talk by Gunther Hauk, famed honey bee advocate and bio-dynamic farmer currently living in Virginia.

The First Class Report was given.

- Class lessons have been occurring each month throughout the year except July and August.
- There are 34 members of which 24 are active.
- The average number of people at any lesson is 15. It was noted that many people have been struggling with illness this past year.
- There is a review conversation after each lesson which usually includes all who have attended the lesson. These prove to be fruitful events.
- A new cycle of Class lessons will begin in September of 2012 with lesson 1.
- People are encouraged to engage in conversation with any of the 3 Class Holders if interested in joining the First Class. September will be an opportune time to join as Lesson 1 begins the cycle.

The Eastern Regional Council Report (Kathleen was not present; written report submitted)
The Eastern Regional Council consists of Ed Scherer; Ann Finucane and Kathleen
Wright. Ed serves as Treasurer and Phone conference chairperson. Ann is the ERC
representative to the General Council and Collegium. Ed serves the northeastern states; Ann
the Mid-Atlantic States, and Kathleen the Southeastern states. The group has bi-monthly phone
conferences to plan their events and for Ann to report on what is happening in the Society based
on the meetings she attends with the General Council and Collegium. While the group usually

meets in person at least once a year, this year because of trying to cut expenses, it has not met. Among the Fall activities of the ERC was phoning lapsed members to find out why they had dropped out (Over 300 did not pay their dues this past year. For most, the reason was financial; others had moved and had been too busy to reconnect with the Society. A very small percentage cited having differences with the Society.) A few people were interviewed as potential new members of the Eastern Regional Council, but so far no one new has been added.

An ongoing activity of the Council is to welcome new members into the Society and ask them if they would like information about contacting groups and branches in their area. The ERC also had a special phone conference with the Treasurer and Membership Coordinator of the Society to discuss the financial problems of the Society and brainstorm ideas for improvements. In March, Kathleen will attend a conference on the *Calendar of the Soul* in Florida as representative of the ERC. In June she will attend the Tennessee annual conference and in August, she and Ann will attend the Leadership Colloquium in Ann Arbor, as well as the AGM there. Plans are in the making for a joint Regional Councils meeting to share ideas for enlivening the work of the Councils. It will happen some time after the Leadership Colloquium. Kathleen intends to contact the South Carolina groups to see if they are interested in having a conference together. There are only a few groups there, but one never hears from them. It is hoped that by connecting the groups, they will begin working together more.

Sophia Sun report: (Kathleen was not present; written report was submitted.)

The Sophia Sun has been published for over four years now. This year the newsletter has been issued bi-monthly instead of monthly as in previous years, with the exception of September and October when there were two consecutive issues. This was because the editor felt that it was taking too much of her time and she was afraid of burning out completely; also there wasn't enough happening to warrant such frequent issues, especially when so many members rely on the list-serve for event reminders. Kathleen Wright is the editor-in-chief and Linda Folsom is the Calendar editor.

This year there are only 18 members who receive hard copies of the newsletter. This, combined with the fact that members who receive the newsletter by mail, pay an extra fee in their dues, has reduced the cost of the newsletter drastically. Each month 12 copies are given to the Emerson Waldorf School so that interested parents and faculty members may read it.

There are approximately 135 members on our list-serve who receive the newsletter via email, plus it is available on our website. There is also a separate email list for people who only wish to receive newsletter. It has nearly 50 members. We receive on average two letters per month, from all over the country (and sometimes from other countries too) from people who have read the newsletter. Some simply praise it or want to subscribe to it; others ask permission to reprint articles or ask us to share information about Anthroposophy or anthroposophical groups. Because we are on the web, many people come upon us when they do searches.

The web manager at RTP.net had been posting the newsletter for us for free for the last few years, but recently announced that he wanted to be paid for the service. A call for help was sent out and Robert Mays stepped forward and said he would be willing to help us out. In addition to posting the newsletter each time, Robert has agreed to make some much needed updates to our website. These should be coming out soon.

ASNC Board Report:

A Treasurer is needed. Anyone interested in stepping forward will be greatly appreciated. By-Laws have been read and reviewed. A new committee has been formed to amend them.

Currently there are 60 dues-paying members of the Branch. A Question was raised as to whether there is a need for an Events Committee.

Financial Report

The financial report was given. Robert Mays gave a different perspective of the situation, changing the lost dollars into assets. Two workshops lost money. Ideas were generated to bring about a new envisioning of our financial picture. Developing a sponsorship program was addressed and will be taken up at the next Board meeting. Other ideas were shared on how to generate money for the various events that we wish to participate in. In general the Branch's financial situation is relatively intact.

National Leadership Colloquium Conference:

This particular event scheduled to happen this summer is being sponsored by the national Anthroposophical Society in an attempt to attract Branch members to gather and to help shape the future of the Society. The Society feels fragile and doesn't feel connected to its members. This conference is an invitation to gather to shape the future of Anthroposophy in America. They are asking for commitments from interested members by March 30, 2012. The conference will take place August 8th and 9th in Ann Arbor, Michigan. Anyone interested in attending needs to contact Peg Carmody.

The question was asked: What is needed in order to go?

Preparation would require readings and get togethers to study suggested reading material. Those interested in going from our area are also asked to follow through with what is to happen in the future. There is a small amount of money available for members who wish to attend. It was estimated that the overall cost would be around \$1500 per person. Ideas were generated about lowering that cost through cooperative endeavors such as fundraisers, renting a van and sharing hotel rooms, etc.

Three questions are proposed to be addressed to all who wish to attend:

- I. What was the spiritual intention behind the founding of the group or initiative in which you are active? (Spirit Recollection)
- 2. What is the current reality of your group or initiative? Where are we succeeding and where are we not? (Spirit Sensing)
 - 3. What is the future asking of us? (Spirit Beholding)

The General Council has begun a study of "The Work of the Angels in Man's Astral Body", in relation to the spiritual mission of America. They have asked that all those who attend also take up a study of this work.

There were a number of comments voiced in response to this news.

Many questioned the necessity of attending such an event and instead proposed that we work regionally with these same questions and bring our own livelihood as a Branch to the forefront of our lives. It was also noted that these same questions have been addressed within

the context of the Branch Home Envisioning Committee over the past year.

Many spoke of allowing for an expansion of the Self to allow new silos of initiatives to be born. Perhaps the national is looking for new leadership. A new order is being called forth. An envisioning is asked of us. Some even called it an initiation within a group process.

Voting was the next agenda item: All three who were up for reelection were reelected for another 3 year term. There were no dissents.

Local initiatives were then voiced:

• Christian Community has an upcoming retreat which will be March 30th –April 1st. Carol Kelly will preside with singing, lectures and dramatic exercises with Margaret Heath. There is a weekly family gathering at the home of Lisa Stauffer which works with various materials and plans festivals together.

• Farm initiative: Study group offered every 3rd Saturday of each month.

Stirring and spraying of preparations will happen Sunday March 18th at Infinity Farm. Jon spoke of different marketing ideas he's working on. He is offering more flexible buying options which will be available this year. There is also collaboration with the Whitted-Bowers farm as well. Joy Kwapien also announced farmhouse events which are being planned and presented at Infinity Farm. These will be announced as they come about. Joy is also working with healing retreats and resuming her nursing practice.

- **Emerson Waldorf School**: is going through lots of changes. A new administrator position is pending. The annual Gala fundraiser is next weekend at the Botanical Gardens in Chapel Hill. The school now has a bulletin blog where anyone can contribute through a sign up process. Just mention Peg Carmody's name when signing up.
- Dan Mohat, a new member of our Branch, spoke of an independent project that he is engaged in. He hopes to be able to implement a healing center on some land adjacent to the school, behind Spence's Farm. As he said, he is inviting the unknown to be a part of the project. Some thought that perhaps the Branch Home initiative could be a part of this endeavor as well. Dan also pointed out that: "there's a difference between running away from something and searching for something." He is working with the school and their Board to further the possibilities of this endeavor.

Beyond the Object-Beyond Sensation July 20, 21, 22 in Hudson, NY

Creativity, whose wingspan once reached from the farthest corners of the sky to the deepest caverns in the earth, and whose flutter could also be heard in the paintings and songs, buildings and sculptures of humans, has been condensed into a crisp morsel. The rich grapes of Dionysus have been dried into particularly hard raisons, the luminosity of Apollo has been condensed into hard light shards projecting through space, ricocheting and refracting. Culture, once a palpable force breathing between large groups of people, has been enchanted into objects on the auction blocks at Sotheby's. Today the shrunken head of cultural life swings, an overcome trophy, on the neck of our time. Lee Uffan, whom the NY Guggenheim hosted for a retrospective last year, described this feeling in an essay and his ideal of the artist as one who has the task of rolling away the stone before the tomb-

"As long as it (the painting) is a representation of a closed phenomenon without externality, it denies any connection with the outside and directness of seeing and feeling. If we look at an object which can be associated at first glance with something outside itself, the unreality and self-contained quality of the representation becomes even more evident."

Not only has art become a collection of objects in the eyes of many people, but these objects have been vacated entirely, becoming merely the sensations in a mutinied context. A successful artist is able to use things arbitrarily, contradicting convention and precedent. Marcel Duchamp's fountain (an *exhibited* urinal) could succeed 100 years ago, but today convention has changed, and what made shrieks then makes yawns now. A new innovation must be found! This grave of art reveals *creativity* as an arbitrary practice of *denying all meaning*. Roland Barthes, in the Death of the Author, describes creative writing thus-

"...writing ceaselessly posits meaning ceaselessly to evaporate it, carrying out a systematic exemption of meaning. In precisely this way literature (it would be better from now on to say writing), by refusing to assign a 'secret', an ultimate meaning, to the text (and to the world as text), liberates what may be called an anti-theological activity, an activity that is truly revolutionary since to refuse to fix meaning is, in the end, to refuse God and his hypostases-reason, science, law."

Today there is a need to transcend the fetishism of culture which Uffan indicates, and to get beyond shadowy conventions that seem to demand de-construction. There is a need to create art that leads us into a deeper experience of *reality and life* and which cannot be roped off and secluded from the viewer, an art. Themes from the last two years, for instance questions regarding the light play art and the metamorphosis of fear, will be taken up again this summer. http://www.freecolumbia.org/report.php or http://northamericanartsection.blogspot.com/ that only finds its true meaning in human lives. Rudolf Steiner describes his artistic attempts, and a new artistic principle, in this way-

"...Painting(s) in our Goetheanum building will not be there for their direct effect, as used to be the case with art in the past, but will be there for the soul to encounter, so that the experience resulting from this encounter will be a work of art."

These issues will be approached from many sides in experimental presentations, discussions, workshops, performances and an exhibition. Presenters at the conference will include, among others, **David Adams, Manfred Bleffert, Marisa Michelson, Nick Pomeroy, Faye Shapiro, Laura Summer and Nathaniel Williams.** There will also be space for artists to present their work to one another. 8th Annual Florida Anthroposophy/Waldorf Conference Presents "Cosmic Cycles, Earthly Rhythms" With a Celebration of the 100th Anniversary of the Rudolf Steiner's *Calendar of the Soul*

Florida anthroposophical groups gathered for their 8th annual Spring Equinox retreat (March 16-18) at a new and improved venue: the 170-acre camp and conference center known as Cedarkirk in Lithia, Florida with its towering live oaks, palms, labyrinth, air-conditioned rooms, family style homecooking and campfire site.

Keynote speakers were Herbert Hagens and astrosophist Mary Adams, who wove together a delightfully fascinating and organic presentation on the conference theme: "Cosmic Cycles, Earthly Rhythms". Also featured on the program was Florida professor Steven Salamone, Ph.D., who is well-known and loved in this region. Artistic presentation came in the form of singing with Barbara Bedingfield and Eurythmy with Judyth Pisani. Every presentation touched on different aspects of the theme from the opening talk to the 11th lesson of the School of Spiritual Science which ended the conference for members of the First Class.

During the course of the lectures Mary Adams revealed that Venus has been in Transit for the past 8 years, the exact time that this conference has been held, a most propitious time indeed! Venus goes into Transit approximately every 120 years, Mary explained. This particular Transit is extremely important, especially since it concludes in 2012. During a Venus transit, Venus moves in front of the Sun weaving five loops over the course of 8 years in a circular fashion so that if you connect the dots of the loops you would have a : "fiery pentagram" or pentagon. Venus transits are a time to "quicken the heart's purest desires". It is during the Venus transit that she shines brightest in the night sky. One of the highlights of the Conference was a viewing of the heavens at night during which Mary pointed out the constellations and told their stories as we stood in awe at the beauty of Venus and Jupiter so bright and close to each other. Venus began the final loop of her journey on March 26th 2012. Venus is the farthest from the Sun on that day as can be in this 8 year cycle. This is a time when "Venus is opening as wide a space as possible for receiving the heart gifts of human beings at this time."

The Conference was opened with the singing of rounds with Barbara Bedingfield, one of the conference organizers. She then announced that the other organizer, Karen Maestrales was ill and would not be able to attend the conference. Barbara gave a history of the past 7 conferences and thanked the Arthur Roth Memorial Fund which was set up by Emily Roth, which helps to fund this conference each year. She then introduced the first speaker, Mary Stewart Adams, a delightfully charming and dynamic speaker who is passionate about her subject – Astrosophy.

Mary related how her love of the stars began at age 9 when she started studying astrology. At the age of 19 she discovered Anthroposophy and at the age of 32 she found her destiny – Astrosophy and she begun studying under Hazel Streker, a student of Willy Sucher's. Mary's talk was interwoven with beautiful poetry relating to the stars and she brought with her beautiful art cards of the Zodiac glyphs created by her artist sister Patricia.

Mary is gaining national fame for another reason. She is the initiator of the "Dark Sky Initiative". She has been instrumental in the mandating of parks protected from "light pollution"

so that people may see the stars in all their brilliant majesty. The Michigan state legislature granted 23,000 acres of protected park land after Mary spoke to them. There are just 6 such protected parks in the US and only 9 in the world. With her dark sky initiative Mary brings the stories of the night sky to groups who come to see the night sky. In addition to this endeavor Mary does astrosophy readings and is the publisher of the Fairy Tale Moons Calendar (see her website www.fairytalemoons.com). She writes articles for various magazines and newspapers and has appeared on radio and television shows. Currently, Mary is writing a book. She told us that the late Tamara Slayton (d. 2003) came up with the title of this conference (Cosmic Cycles, Earthly Rhythms) and that she had wanted to write a book on this theme with Mary. As she lay dying, she told Mary that if she couldn't write the book with Mary on this earth, she would write it with her across the Threshold.

Mary read a poem of Emily Dickinson's in which the poet writes "Stars are like asterisks to point the way". Mary said that the stars help us understand our biography. Saturn, who is known as Father Time, sets the boundaries. The 7 year cycle is based on the Saturn rhythm of 28 years, which is the time it takes for him to revolve around the sun. The 28 years are divided into four parts. During one's life, one goes through "Saturn returns" every 28 years - at age 28, 56 and so on (if one has the good fortune to live so long). It is at these returns that one becomes "free to make new choices; new births happen". Mary also noted that according to astrosophist Elisabeth Vreede, who was one of the original Vorstand members, each of us comes from our own unique star and that there is a moment of decision known as the Midnight Hour of the Soul when the soul decides to reincarnate. This occurs when the Spirit is near its own star. Mary spoke about the nature of each planet, especially of Venus and details about the Venus Transit which began on June 4, 2004 and how Venus is connected with the laying of the Foundation stone of the Goetheanum.; about the Copernican revolution and how it represents Lucifer's slaving of Isis, and that her grave is in the star Sirius; she spoke of the differences between the tropical and sidereal systems of astrology; the Mystery of Golgotha; how the planets relate to the Easter Holy Week and the Christmas Holy Nights. She also recommended many books that may be of interest to Anthroposophists, including Cycles of Becoming by Alexander Ruperti, The

Human Life by Gisela and George O'Neill; **Citizens of the Cosmos** by Beredene Jocelyn (talks about Steiner's life and chart) and for absolute beginners: **Astrology for Dummies**.

Mary Stewart Adams and Herbert Hagens Calendar of the Soul's 100th Anniversary

Most of our readers probably know Herbert Hagens very well, but for those who do not: Herbert was born into an anthropsophical household, so he came to Anthroposophy at a very young age. He served for many years on the Eastern Regional Council and on the National Council of the Anthroposophical Society in America. He also served as editor of its newsletter. Herbert lectures at the Goetheanum on the Mystery Dramas and has been a Class Holder for the School of Spiritual Science for many years. Herbert is known for his delightful sense of humor.

Herbert delivered a fascinating account of the history of the Calendar of the Soul and brought with him one of his most precious possessions – an original copy of the first printing of it from 1912. He gave participants some copies of the zodiacal glyphs in it, along with an article about it. He also gave us a schedule for the year's verses from Easter 2012 to Easter 2013. However, all this could not begin without Herbert's tradition of bringing some levity first. He confessed that the source of his repertoire of laughs www.cleanchristianjokes.com. He also brought some interesting serious facts in connection with the dates of this conference: March 16, 1244 was the burning of the Cathars at Montsegur; March 17 (ca. 461) was the death of St. Patrick and March 18, 1314 was the burning of Jacques Demolay.

Like Mary, Herbert brought poetry to his talk. His first reading was from the Nobel Prize for Literature winner, Wislawa Szymborska's "Nothing's a Gift". Next Herbert tied in his talk with Mary's by speaking of the rhythms in our bodies and what type of meditations are designed for each: the physical has a yearly rhythm; suggested devotions: The Lord's Prayer, the Foundation Stone mantram; The Etheric has a monthly rhythm, suggested work: the Virtues of the zodiac; the astral body has a weekly rhythm, *Calendar of the Soul*; the Ego has a daily rhythm, and Steiner gave many verses for the beginning and ending of the day that one can do.

Some facts about the *Calendar of the Soul* that we learned from Herbert: Outside of the Mystery dramas, the meditations in the *Calendar of the Soul* are the only meditations published during Steiner's life. The idea of creating a *Calendar of the Soul* came from Imma Eckardstein, who often traveled with the Steiners on their journeys. She was the costume designer for the Mystery dramas. Eckardstein had asked Steiner for images for the zodiac. He told her to look at the rising sun each day and write of her experiences. He then gave her some sketches.

In 1911 Steiner formed an esoteric group. It fell apart after just one meeting, but the one thing that they decided was that they wished to help write a *Calendar of the Soul* with Dr. Steiner. It was published in 1912. The first copy was presented by Steiner to an audience in Helsingfors, Russia. Steiner Books has printed a facsimile of this volume. The original book began with notes about what happened each day of the year in history: saints' days, births and deaths of important people and historical events. In the back of the book were the verses. Rudolf Steiner's name is not even mentioned in the book! This is probably because a team worked on it. Later on, a book with just the verses and glyphs designed by Steiner was published. Emil Molt of the famed Waldorf-Astoria Cigarette Factory put a Verse from the *Calendar of the Soul* in each cigarette pack it sold! Herbert reminisced how when he was a small child, every day his Grandmother would read aloud in German the verse from the *Calendar of the Soul* and that he had to be quiet when she read. Although he did not understand the words she was reading, her Mood was deeply felt by him and thus, a seed was planted in him during his childhood that later blossomed into his devotion to the *Calendar*.

Herbert then gave the conference participants some handouts about the patterns revealed in the **Calendar** and what they mean. One was of a lemniscate with the numbered verses on it. At the crossing point of the lemniscate one fidns Michaelmas. Herbert spoke of the Light Verses and Temptation Verses. He likened the stages on the figure to the phases in flower development. He also explained how each verse has its "mirror" at the opposite time of the year (1 and 52; 2 and 51; 3 and 50, etc.)

In the following session, Herbert and Mary presented a talk in which they magically wove together the themes from their two preceding talks. Herbert began with a beautiful thought-provoking poem by David Whyte entitled: "What to Remember When Waking". Mary began by saying that the images of the zodiac also correspond to the phases of seed, bud, flower and fruit that Herbert had drawn at the previous talk to illustrate the phases of the plant and how they correspond to the year and the *Calendar of the Soul*. She also read a quote of Steiner's that "the more abundantly the Cosmic fills the human being, the more harmony and peace on earth there will be." She mentioned in reference to Herbert's discussion of how to work with the

Calendar from year to year, that there are never 52 weeks between Easters and that fixed things and symmetrical things have the forces of death in them. Therefore, the Calendar is "living" in that it changes from year to year. We must use creative methods to "adjust" so that we are working on the verse that corresponds to the mood of the week. Mary then presented us with the zodiac glyphs of Aries and Pisces done by Patricia D'Alessa and hang in the Society's headquarters in Ann Arbor. She said that Fishes (Pisces) can be thought of as footprints, one in the spiritual world and one on the earth. Its motto could be "to find one's feet but be conscious of being a spiritual being. In the image of Aries there are two heads, reminding us that the human being is created in the Image of God. Mary spoke of the relationship between the Constellations and the Holy Night and how to work during these nights artistically. Herbert pointed out that Karl König's *Commentary on the Calendar* contains watercolor sketches he did on the verses.

Herbert pointed out that there is one day in the Calendar of the Soul that does not belong on a Sunday (all other verses are supposed to begin on Sundays) and that is the Verse for St. John's. This is because in 1912, St. John's occurred on a Monday. It is the 12th verse. Herbert said he wishes that new Calendars of the Soul would come out every year. He also remarked how interesting it is that the 100th anniversary of the Calendar coincides with the end of the Mayan Calendar. Mary then told how the Mayans had 360 days in their calendar plus 5 "evil days". In the Egyptian calendar there are also 5 days at the end of the regular calendar and this is based on the story of Jeb and the goddess Nut.

It was mentioned that the tropical zodiac (the traditional one) is fixed, while the sidereal shows the true positions of the stars today. The constellations have different sizes; they are not equal and thus the real time in each constellation varies, e.g. Aries is small; Virgo is huge.

So many fascinating thoughts were shared. Herbert ended the session with the poem "Sunset" by Rilke.

In the afternoon conference, participants were treated to an Aristotelean–style lecture entitled "The Earth and Its Future: The Rise of Self-Consciousness" from Professor Stephen Salamone, who teaches at the University of Southern Florida and has been a student of Steiner since 1968. Dr. Salamone began his talk by stating the four steps for reconnecting with the Kosmos. His presentation covered a lot of territory and combined concepts from Steiner, the ancient Greeks, the age of Enlightenment and thoughts from today's culture, even quoting from the Matrix and asking questions about our future as human beings and whether we will be replaced by machines. Toward the end of his talk he brought up questions related to memory and thinking and concluded with the St. Francis prayer: **Canticle of the Creatures**.

Overall, the conference was fascinating and inspiring. There was so much amazing content that not even a tenth of the notes I took are covered in this article. One of the best aspects of any conference is socializing with the other participants and below is what I learned is happening in Florida:

Latest News On Anthroposophical Groups and Initiatives in Florida; Miami Group to Sponsor Inter-America Conference in Puerto Rico

The largest anthroposophical group in Florida at present is the **Michael Group of Miami**. There are currently 5 Study Groups there. While the community does not yet have a Class Holder, a group of several of Class members have been given permission to study the Class Lessons together each week. Last year Richard Dancey of the Christian Community came to their group and spoke on "The Path of Christianity". The Waldorf International School in Miami, which was founded in 1990, consists of grades K-6. This past year, some teachers-in-training from Germany did their practicum at this Miami School. The school has a website at www.waldorfmiami.org

Inter-American Conference Being Planned Now

The big news for the Miami community is that Yvonne Cumming, who is one of the founders of the International Waldorf School, as well as a teacher there and a veritable anthroposophical "Mother" of her community will be helping to organize an "inter-American" conference. The idea for this conference arose when it was realized that the Pan-American conferences which have been held mostly in South America for the past few years, have not been attended by virtually anyone from the North American continent . A more central area was needed. A strong leader for the conference was also needed and so Yvonne was asked to help with this and she agreed. Yvonne discovered Anthroposophy at the age of 16. When she met her future husband Richard a couple of years later, most of their dates consisted of going to

anthroposophical Study groups. After college, they went to Beaver Run for a Camphill training in Curative Education. After three years they went to Canada where they helped found a Camphill-style village there. After 10 years it was time to move on. They were invited to help found a Waldorf School in Costa Rica. Though they tried for over three years, there were just too many obstacles and just when they were realizing that this was not where their destiny was, they were invited to help found a Waldorf School in Miami and that is were they have been ever since. The school opened in 1990.

Many people are already involved in the planning of this conference, including: Ute Kraemer, Jorge Sanz-Cordona, Torin Finser, and Gene Golloghly. Virginia Sease will be one of the keynote speakers. The topic for the conference will be: "The Spiritual Mission of the Americas between Asia and Europe". The best location for the conference was decided to be Puerto Rico. In addition to all the countries of the North and South American continents and the surrounding islands, anthroposophical members from all European nations which have a connection to the Americas will be invited. The date for the conference will be in July 2013. Many details have yet to be worked out, but Yvonne wanted the word to get out as quickly as possible so that people could mark their calendars and hold this initiative in their consciousness.

Clearwater Steiner Circumstudies

There is a group in Clearwater, Florida (close to Tampa Bay) which calls itself the "Steiner Circumstudies Group". The group meets monthly with Dr. Steven Salamone as their leader. The group is planning to hold a Karmic Relations weekend workshop in the near future and to start a Foundation Studies program. Barbara Bedingfield, one of the organizers of the annual Florida Conference is a member of the group there.

Not far away is the Sun Coast Waldorf School, located in Palm Harbor, which Barbara Bedingfield helped found inn 1998. She taught there for several years and now serves as its Director of Development and Enrollment .The school has now graduated 3 classes of 8th graders and serves grades K-8. It has its own website at www.suncoastwaldor.org, as well as its own youtube channel: www.youtube.com/user/SuncoastWaldorfvideo.

Boca Raton Group

The Boca Raton Group has an anthroposophical Study group with about 5 people who are studying *The Threshold* by Rudolf Steiner. They also have a Waldorf-inspired school: The Sea Star Initiative which has 22 children in grades K-4. Rena Osmer who graduated form Antioch's teacher training program in 1985 is the Faculty Chair person there. She is also one of the founders of the Lifeways Program. The school has a website at www.seastarinitiative.org

Waldorf Sarasota

The Waldorf Sarasota School which was founded in 2000 has grades K-4th. The school won a couple of awards this past year including the "Favorite Children's Educational Program" by the Natural Awakenings NATTY Award. Waldorf Sarasota is being featured in the PBS award-winning series "Gulf Coast Journal" with Jack Perkins. It was shown at 8 PM on March 29 and will be shown again April 1 at 2 PM on WEDU.. On April 14, the school is sponsoring a "Knit-A Thon" to raise funds and awareness of Waldorf Education. The school's website is www.waldorfsarasota.com

Former teachers at the Sarasota Waldorf School, Anne and Joe Savage, have been busy with their own initiatives: Anne has a Waldorf-inspired pre-school in her home known as "Sun Ray" and Joe has been trying to start a Waldorf Charter School in the area. Joe told us that there are currently 50 Waldorf charter schools in America (30 in California alone.). He says that with all the applications that have been submitted around the country there could be as many as 85 within two years. Joe's first application for a charter was turned down by the local School Board, but that did not stop Joe. He wrote to the State Board of Education and asked if the reasons given for denial by his local school board were valid and they said no, there were no legal grounds for their rejection, and so Joe will reapply next year.

Jacksonville Group

Last but not least is the Seaside Play Garden, which is a Waldorf initiative in Jacksonville, FL. There are 29 children in its Pre-K and K classes. The school has applied to become a charter school for grades 1-5 with a Waldorf-inspired curriculum. Applications are now being accepted online. The school has a website www.seasidecommunityschools.org

Florida anthroposophical activity is growing slowly but surely. There are great heart forces in the people there and it is hoped this will attract more initiatives to develop here and that more locals will join the efforts.

Anthroposophy, which means "the wisdom of man", is a spiritual philosophy and path to self-knowledge, which "leads the spiritual in the human being to the spiritual in the universe", according to its teacher, Rudolf Steiner (1861-1925). Rudolf Steiner was a brilliant "Renaissance man" from Austria who was a philosopher, scientist, artist, playwright, architect, social activist, teacher and meditant, who had a direct perception of the spiritual worlds. Anthroposophy, which is also known as Spiritual Science, teaches, among other things, the laws of reincarnation and Karma. It has a Christ-centered view of world evolution. Steiner founded the School of Spiritual Science, as well as the General Anthroposophical Society, which he described as "a union of people who desire to further the life of the soul – both in the individual and in human society – on the basis of true knowledge of the spiritual world". In addition to giving over 6,000 lectures, most of which have been made into books, he helped to found many initiatives that are still thriving today including: the Waldorf School movement, anthroposophical medicine,

biodynamic farming, and Eurythmy. Based on his indications, hundreds of initiatives have developed such as: the Curative education movement, the Camp Hill Villages for the handicapped, Weleda remedies, Dr. Hauschka cosmetics, WALA, True Botanica, Astrosophy, Rhythmical Massage, the Alliance for Childhood, The Christian Community, Anthroposophic Prison Outreach, Lazure painting, Demeter, advancements in architecture, science, social and economic reform (The Threefold Social Order, community banks), mathematics and painting. In addition, there are many publishing houses and libraries dedicated to his works throughout the world.
